What are AP classes?	What are AP exams?
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Advanced Placement courses are college-level courses taken in high school. A national exam is given in May of each year and scored on a 1 to 5 scale. A score of a 3, 4 or 5 is considered passing and leads to college credit in most all 4-year colleges and universities. There are 39 different AP courses available to high school students.	AP Exams are administered by schools worldwide on set dates each May. Exams usually last around three hours. Each AP Exam usually consists of multiple-choice questions and free-response questions (essay, problem-solving, oral response).

A recent study* showed that students who earned a 3, 4, or 5 on the AP Exam had higher first-year college grade point averages and were more likely to return for the second year of college than non-AP students of similar ability.	 Students who take five years or more to graduate can spend \$8,000 to \$27,000 for each additional year in college. The typical college cost per year for a four-year public institution is \$8,142 for in-state students and \$19,670 for out-of-state students.* Students attending private institutions might expect to incur \$27,389 for each additional year it takes to earn a bachelor's degree.*
